Sidney Kimmel Medical College Alumni Association Welcomes New President Joseph F. Majdan, MD, CV '81

Joseph F. Majdan, MD, CV '81, was elected president of the Sidney Kimmel Medical College Alumni Association in April 2014. Born in Hackensack, N.J., he was the only child of Polish immigrants. At 5, he moved with his parents to Bucks County, Pa., and later attended Holy Ghost Preparatory School. He then attended LaSalle University, where he obtained a Bachelor of Arts in history and biology. He received his doctor of medicine degree at the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine and completed his residency in internal medicine at the Presbyterian-University of Pennsylvania Medical Center. Majdan came to Jefferson in 1981 for a fellowship in cardiovascular medicine and is still here 33 years later.

The Alumni Association reminds us of our noble heritage and challenges each and every one of us to be a living example of all that has been, is and must always define a Jefferson physician. There was something about Jefferson that touched me when I first came here and still does so to this very day, for Jefferson is more than an iconic institution of learning and healing.
